I'm convinced that God has a bit of insight on His own creation. Don't you think that He knows a little something about what you and I really need? God ordained Sabbath rest for our refreshment. Rest is serious business to God. He insisted that even during the busiest of times there needed to be rest. The Sabbath was God's gift to God's people. It was given as an act of grace. It allowed much needed time to rest and refocus. And it reflected the condition of their spiritual relationship to God. It invites us among much else to remember. And remembering in a way that reminds us of who we are is the necessary groundwork for Sabbath practices.
